Annual Report to the Public

2008 Highlights

Financial Stewardship: Citizens and taxpayers have a responsibility to become informed regarding the expenditures of local tax dollars. School systems are given the stewardship of these monies to utilize effectively to promote the growth and achievement of children. To many citizens, Delta County School District has an excellent reputation for strong fiscal management. Independent auditors and the Colorado Department of Education have repeatedly supported this reputation. Over the past four years our district has moved from a position of having no fiscal reserve to having nearly one month's operating expenses for crisis or emergency situations. Additionally, this past year, our district ranked first in school districts having more than 3,200 students in the percentage of revenue spent in direct support of children. This accomplishment is more remarkable due to the fact that Delta Schools rank 160th out of 178 school districts in the amount of funding it receives (real dollar amount) to educate each child. Our first priority is to directly utilize funds to serve students - they are, without question, at the center of each and every decision we make!

The most important aspect of strong financial stewardship is the effective utilization of existing revenue. Second, is the pursuit of additional revenue sources like grants that add to or support current programs. In 2008, Delta County received \$263,000 in additional literacy grants and \$50,000 to establish recruitment and retention efforts for our instructional staff. Last year, the state granted Delta County over \$600,000 in our pursuit of early childhood education. Last January, a remodeled Garnet Mesa Elementary School opened in Delta with the support of a two million dollar state BEST grant (Building Excellent Schools Today). This spring, we intend to apply for a state grant to help replace Cedaredge Elementary School. These two elementary schools were designated as our facilities in greatest need. It is important to note that both of these building projects have been undertaken without asking for additional taxpayer support. We believe that safe and healthy school environments are important for every child's success.

Third, after consideration of stewardship of public dollars and aggressive pursuit of additional operating dollars outside of taxes, the public is concerned about a school district's financial place in the community. Delta County School District has a yearly operating budget of over 50 million dollars. It is important to realize that over 90 percent of this amount remains in the local economy: employment, goods, and services. We also support the local economy by preparing over 500 students each year to enter into additional training in fields like health care, business, law, drafting, mining, and mechanics. Our facilities are open and readily utilized by our community.

Early Learning Opportunities: Delta County Schools believe that early learning can play a crucial and significant role in a child's future achievement performance. The Backpack Program has been successfully serving over 500 Delta County parents in supporting the home instruction of their children for over 15 years. The returnable "tubbies" encourage and educate parents in supporting their child's skills in fine and gross motor understanding and pre-literacy.

Within the last two years, the Delta County Preschool program (BELA) has grown tremendously. The 30 student program of 2004/05 has grown to 208 this fall. These students were previously unserved by any formal preschool program. In addition, BELA has partnered with the Head Start program to serve an additional 119 students. This entire outreach effort (\$653,000) has been *created* and sustained without any additional support from the taxpayers of Delta County. The research documents that school achievement is greatly enhanced by early learning. Students who participated in Backpack, combined with preschool, are showing remarkable achievement results in elementary school and beyond.

Colorado Growth Model: The State of Colorado launched a new method of academic accountability in 2008—it is called the Colorado Growth Model. This new concept measures the amount of growth students realize in an academic year compared to their peers. Our district had great success in the area of growth and was recognized in 2008 by the Commissioner of Education, Dr. Dwight Jones. Two of our schools, Hotchkiss High School and Cedaredge Middle School were awarded the prestigious Commissioner's Cup Award for "beating the odds". This award is given to schools that have students in low socio-economic situations showing significant growth relative to their peers. Additionally, our 2008 school district graduates were granted over one million dollars in pursuit of higher education and had two Boettcher Scholarship winners in 2008 (bringing the total number of Boettcher Scholars to nearly 25 in the last 20 years—truly outstanding!)

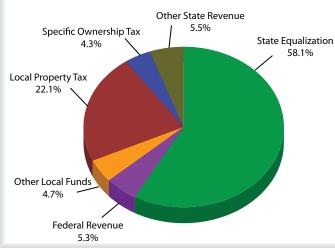

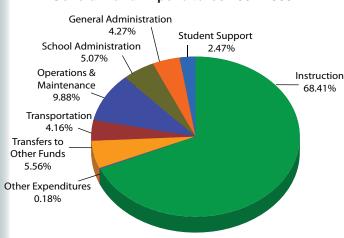

Report of the Board and Superintendent Goals Related to Academic Achievement for 2007

ACT (American College Testing) given to all Juniors: All goals were met in the sub-areas of composite (summary), reading and science scores. Positive growth over the previous year was noted in English and Math scores, but, fell slightly short of .2% improvement goal of English and Math respectively.

CSAP: Overall cut score goals (the amount above or below the state average) were met. The district moved from -102 in all grades and subjects 3rd grade to 10th grade to -25 in all grades and subjects. Significant accomplishment.

- Elementary goals moved from -40 in 2007 to +13 this year (Outstanding)
- Middle schools moved from -33 in 2007 to -16 in 2008 -Goal met.
- High schools moved from -29 in 2007 to -22 in 2008 Goal met.

Graduation Rate: The district graduation goal of improved rates from 79.5% to 82% was reached. In addition, many other students completed their graduation requirement through summer programs and GED. The completion rate increased from 85.1% to 86.6% exceeding all Western Colorado Districts as well as the State of Colorado. Our ultimate goal over time is that over 95% of all eligible students will graduate with a diploma.

Attendance: Our attendance goal was not reached. The rate of 95.7% fell short of the goal of 96%. However, this daily attendance rate is remarkable and exceeds the attendance rates of corporate America. Time on task and punctuality are important attributes for future employees.

Colorado Student Assessment Program

Three different types of assessments monitor the academic progress of our student in our district used this test last year, so results will not be available. students. The main assessment used in Colorado is CSAP. CSAP stands for Colorado Student Assessment Program. It is a test designed to measure student achievement in relationship to the Colorado Model Content Standards. The results of CSAP tests provide a snapshot of student achievement in the content areas of reading, writing, and math for grades 3-10, and science for grades 5, 8, and 10.

The second assessment is the Spanish version of the CSAP test. It is only available for 3rd and 4th grade students in reading and math. Only one

The third assessment is the CSAP-Alternate or CSAPA. Students who have significant disabilities may have a different level of expectations and would not benefit by taking the CSAP. This test is given to students in grades 3-11. The results will not be disaggregated by individual grades and subgroups because the numbers are too small for public reporting.

Additional CSAP information, disaggregated by each grade and content area, is available on our website, at the District Office, and at all schools.

Colorado District Diagnostic Growth Summary

Colorado's Growth Model provides a way for educators to understand how much growth a student made from one CSAP administration to the next. The Growth Model compares each student's performance to students in the same grade throughout Colorado who had similar CSAP scores in past years, and calculates a Student Growth Percentile. If the student grew as much or more than 60 percent of her peers, the student would have a 60th Growth Percentile.

This information pertains to Section 1 of the following chart.

Student Growth Percentiles can be used to determine "How much growth is enough?", specifying the amount of growth necessary for each student to reach proficiency ("catch up") or maintain proficiency ("keep up") within three years or by 10th grade. In the table below, the 2008 data for Percent on Track to Catch Up gives the district percentages of students, scoring Unsatisfactory or Partially Proficient in 2007, making enough growth during the 2007-08 academic year to reach proficiency within three years or 10th grade. Similarly, the 2008 data for Percent on Track to Keep Up gives the district percentages of students, scoring Proficient or Advanced in 2007, making enough growth during the 2007-08 academic year to remain at or above proficient over the next three years or 10th grade.

Student Growth Percentiles can be aggregated at the grade, school, and district levels to provide a summary number. This is done through finding the median score (the middle score if you rank the scores from highest to lowest). Below you will find Median Student Growth Percentiles for your district reflecting growth from 2005 to 2006, from 2006 to 2007, and from 2007 to 2008.

The state median growth percentile is always 50, so it is useful to examine substantial differences from 50 when looking for high and low growth. Median Student Growth Percentiles of 50 and above are colored in green in the tables below. Data are provided only for those students who are not new to the school after October 1st of the academic school year. If data are not shown below, fewer than 16 students were included in the group.

The mission is to provide career and technical certificate programs and courses in health, trades, technical, and business fields at the secondary and postsecondary levels. Career and Technical Education (CTE) empowers students for effective participation in an economy as world-class workers and citizens. Delta-Montrose Technical College (DMTC) currently has 13 programs with 65 secondary or postsecondary certificates. During the 2007-2008 school year, DMTC enrolled 2,408 individuals in at least one class, conducted 433 certificate classes, 259 non-certificate classes, and employed more that 110 full-time and part-time instructors. 85% of the students that completed a program in the 07-08 school year, were employed within the first six months of graduation. Since DMTC is part of the Colorado Community College System the program classes are transferable to Community Colleges throughout the state.
